Position of the course

This advanced courses focuses on Russian literary texts of the 19th, 20th and 21st centuries – short stories, plays and/or poems from different tendencies and periods are discussed. The course focuses on literary analysis and builds on the insights the student has acquired through the seminar of the course Overview of Russian literature.

Contents

The course covers prose, poetry and/or drama, from the 19th century until today. Special attention is being paid to the different ways to analyse literary texts thoroughly (from perspective to intertextuality).

Initial competences

To have successfully completed the courses Russian I, II and III and Russian Literature I / Overview of Russian literature or to have acquired the necessary skills by other means. The class itself is conducted in Dutch, but all literary texts are in Russian.

Final competences

- 1 To have critical insight into the qualities and historic characteristics of the 19th, 20th and 21st century Russian literature.
- 2 To read, interpret and analyze narrative, dramatic and lyrical texts and manifestos and literary criticism in the original language.
- 3 To think analytically about issues related to literary analysis.
- 4 To analyze and interpret Russian literary works on the basis of various scholarly methods and approaches.
- 5 To write a short paper (analysis) on a literary work on the basis of a concrete research assignment.
- 6 To have critical insight in different tools for literary analysis that are important for the study of Russian literature.
- 7 To reflect critically and comment in a constructive way on papers and presentations by peers.
- 8 To give a presentation on an independently developed research proposal (analysis), in cooperation with peers.

Teaching methods

Group work, Seminar, Independent work, Peer teaching

Interactive seminar on the basis of carefully prepared readings.

Independent work: a paper on a literary text; a presentation on a literary work (together with a peer); a peer review report; a response paper; a certain amount of novels to read independently (cf. reading list).
