Position of the course

This introductory course makes students understand the chronology, periodical and political history of South Asia. The course helps students acquire the skills to read, understand and use the most important works on the history of the region.

Contents

Survey of the history of South Asia from the Bronze Age up to the twentieth century.

The students write a written task, to become familiar with the use of specialized standard literature

Initial competences

5 To critically approach a source text.
