Position of the course

This course builds further on the learning outcomes and competences acquired in Arabic Language Acquisition II.

Contents

This course consists of two components: Media and Egyptian.

- Media: contextualising and discourse analysis of written and spoken (political) media items + producing reports and texts in MSA
- Egyptian: speaking and listening exercises related to topics and contexts of the Media component

- 1 Students know most frequent expressions and vocabulary from Arabic media language in productive ways.
- 2 Students actively engage with the (political) context in which Arabic newspapers and newssites operate.
- 3 Students directly retrieve essential information from an Arabic written item, especially news messages.
- 4 Students understand spoken Arabic news messages and announcements.
- 5 Students retrieve a wide range of information in Arabic news messages (written and spoken).
- 6 Students take part in natural, unprepared Egyptian Arabic conversations on topics relating to current (political) affairs.
- 7 Students write an Arabic text to communicate an analysis and/or opinion.

Extra information on the examination methods

Written and oral examination over the entire course and during end-of-the-semester exams. The written part assesses the acquisition of writing, reading and listening skills in Media Arabic, as well as the capacity to understand scientific texts offering keys to assess the context of media production. The oral part assesses the acquisition of listening and speaking skills in Egyptian Arabic, as well as the capacity to present orally elements allowing the contextualisation of media debates.

Participation: active participation in classes, and timely submission of assignments and tasks.

Calculation of the examination mark

Reading, listening, contextualizing of Media Arabic: 70%

Egyptian Arabic: 30%

Both components Media Arabic and Egyptian Arabic are subdivided according to skills into end-of-term evaluation and continuous assessment (active participation during classes, and tests and assignments). To pass the course unit, the final grade must be at least 10/20. Students who do not participate in (one of the skills-related parts of) the assessment, or have a mark below 10/20 for one of the skills-related parts, automatically fail the entire course. Final marks higher than 10/20 will, in this case, be reduced to the highest mark that does not qualify for automatic upgrade ('deliberation') (7/20). A pass mark for one of the skills-related parts means that the assessment of that part does not need to be retaken in case of a resit only.

Students are nevertheless free to decide to retake the complete evaluation.
