Position of the course

This project course allows students to expand the language skills of Bulgarian, Bosnian/Croatian/Serbian, Russian or Slovenian and knowledge of East-European cultures obtained in the BA East-European Languages and Cultures, or equivalent, in an integrated and entrepreneurial way. Students work individually or in group on a topic of social relevance, that is linked to one of the thematic courses. They make active and productive use of one of the Slavic languages mentioned above.

Contents

In this course, students independently work on a project that is connected to one of the thematic courses from the Master East-European Languages and Cultures. In addition to the independent application of knowledge obtained in the relevant thematic courses, this course focusses on the active and productive use of one of the Slavic languages that are taught in the study programme, entrepreneurial acting and social impact. Specific attention is also given to interaction with peers. Students independently choose a topic that is connected to one of the thematic courses and has demonstrable social relevance. The thematic course specialists provide content-related guidance during consultation moments in the course of the first semester, before the independent project work starts and in the final phase of the project's realisation.

For the realisation of their projects, students actively and productively use the

target language (course session A: Russian, course session B: South Slavic language). There is room for an individual trajectory, with focussed supervision during the realisation of the project and particular attention for independent, active and productive language use. Students communicate in the target language with the language teachers and other actors potentially involved and also produce output in the target language.

The course motivates students to create social impact and act entrepreneurially. Social impact is broadly understood here. It can imply public outreach beyond a narrowly academic audience as well as cooperation with non-academic actors in Flanders, Belgium or Eastern Europe. The student independently determines the specific format for disseminating the results of the project. It is essential that the student works in a results-oriented manner and addresses a broader audience. Finally, students during the project enter into dialogue with their peers. It is possible to collaborate on a project, but more importantly students should engage with the work of others through collective consultation sessions and in the evaluation of the projects.

Initial competences

The student masters the final terms of the BA study programme East-European Languages and Cultures or obtained equivalent target competences in a different way. The student should have successfully taken the South Slavic or Russian Language Semester or Bosnian/Croatian/Serbian IV, Bulgarian IV, Slovenian IV or Russian: Language and Text III or should have equivalent knowledge of the relevant language.

Final competences

- 1 To communicate effectively in the target language about a complex and socially relevant topic
- 2 To apply advanced knowledge of the target language in a productive and interactive way.
- 3 To fine-tune communication and presentation skills to specialists and nonspecialists alike.
- 4 To act independently and entrepreneurially.
- 5 To demonstrate social engagement by making own insights accessible for a broader audience and entering into dialogue with non-academic actors.
- 6 To collaborate with peers.
- 7 To apply academic knowledge on Eastern Europe on concrete social challenges.
- 8 To present one's own position in current social, political or cultural debates regarding Eastern Europe in an accessible and creative manner, also in the target language.
- 9 To demonstrate proficiency in independent project management and resultsoriented acting.
- 10 To deal with social questions in and on Eastern Europe in an ethical and integer way.
- 11 To constructively contribute to the work of others.
- 12 To adjust own insights, work or behaviour on the basis of evaluations by and dialogue with teachers, peers and others.

Group work, Seminar, Independent work

Extra information on the teaching methods

Independent work: Students develop a specific project within one of the topics of the thematic course units. The students independently determine the contents and format of their projects.

Seminar: Through collective consultation sessions and individual guidance students receive content- and language-related supervision during the realisation of the project. In the last week of the course, students present their projects to each other

Groupwork: Students are engaged in the realization of the projects of their peers

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during consultation sessions. Peer-assessment is taken into consideration for the final evaluation. Provided that there is a clear added value, students can work in group on a particular project.

This course is organised throughout the academic year. Two introductory tutorials are organised in the first semester, but the actual project work takes place during the first seven weeks of the second semester. All collective and individual consultation schedules and the project presentation fall in this period.
