Position of the course

The internship is an elective course in the master and amounts to 240 hours of internship in a professional context. Through the internship, students can gain a field experience and apply the taught competences in language and literature. An internship in both the profit and non-profit sector can be chosen. Knowledge of Dutch is necessary to do an internship in Belgium or the Netherlands.

Contents

Internship activities may include:

- Oral and written communication, in Dutch and/or foreign languages
- Translating to and from Dutch
- Editorial work for various media and purposes
- Research work: collecting, processing, synthesizing, analyzing information
- Project operation: participating in the preparation of new projects
- Language advice
- Language training: e.g. short, intensive language course for employees of the internship
- Intercultural competences: e.g. advice on intercultural aspects and sensitivities

The internship includes 240 hours. The internship can be taken in concentrated form during the lesson- and exam-free period in January-February or during the summer holidays. The internship can also be carried out over a longer period of time.

Students are allowed to apply for internships themselves. A list of traineeship partners of the programme will also be available.

After the selection of the internship, the student, internship mentor of the internship and internship supervisor of Ghent University put together an internship assignment and job description. After this, the official internship contract can be signed.

Halfway through the internship we schedule an interim evaluation interview.

Feedback from the internship will be discussed in this conversation. Any difficulties during the internship can be raised earlier.

After the internship, the student draws up an internship report of 5000 words containing (1) a description and analysis of the internship, (2) a report of their own internship activities and (3) a critical reflection on your internship activities.

Annexes may be added to the report. The internship report is written in Dutch.

Extra information on the examination methods

Three factors will be taken into account for the evaluation of your internship.

1. An evaluation by your internship mentor at your internship, expressed in an evaluative text and a score out of 20. The overall evaluation is supported by a questionnaire that takes into account three aspects: knowledge, attitude and skills and quality of the internship assignment. Evaluation form can be found on Ufora.
2. The quality of the internship report. The internship report is written in Dutch (regardless of the language used at the internship), according to an imposed structure. Critical reflection occupies an important place in this reporting. See internship guide.
3. A final interview with the stage coordinator.

Calculation of the examination mark

Non-period-related evaluation (100%): the final score is calculated based on the behavioral evaluation on the work floor by the internship mentor (50%), the submitted internship report (40%) and the final interview (10%).

If you do not participate in one or more of the forms of evaluation, you cannot pass the whole of the course and the final grade is reduced to the highest non-deliberable grade (9/20) if the final grade is higher.
