### Position of the course

This course unit aims at students who do not have Dutch as a mother tongue and who have a command of Dutch at the B2 level of the Common European Framework. More specifically the aim of the course is that:

- The students can understand more difficult, longer texts on a variety of topics and recognize their implicit meaning.
- The students can express themselves clearly - both orally and in writing - and can use language effectively for professional, academic and social purposes.
- The students can communicate fluently and spontaneously, so that the interaction with native speakers is smooth.
- The students can also produce clear, well-structured and detailed oral and written texts on complex subjects, using appropriate linking words in the process.
- The students can explain their viewpoints orally or in writing on any given topic, setting out the pros and cons, as well as different options.

The emphasis in this course lies predominantly on professional, business, and academic communication.

### Contents

In this course the students practice their:

- Speaking and conversation skills: e.g. presentations, participating in meetings and other advanced-level conversation exercises.
- Listening skills: listening exercises based on authentic audiovisual material.
- Reading skills: reading exercises on the basis of authentic texts about current affairs, metalinguistic subjects etc.
- Writing skills: e.g. business or academic writing, synthesis exercises, note taking,

essay or opinion writing, etc.

- Linguistics: expansion of vocabulary and understanding of the grammatical structure of the sentence.

### **Initial competences**

The student masters B2-level of Dutch of the Common European Framework.

### **Final competences**

- 1 Having a command of Dutch at C1 level of the Common European Framework of Reference for comprehension (listening and reading), oral skills (production and interaction) and writing skills. [B.1.1 assessed]. The first competence implies the two following competences:
  - Having a command of Dutch grammar at C1 level of the Common European Framework of Reference.
  - Applying the grammatical knowledge correctly in a written or oral assignment.
- 2 Having a good knowledge of vocabulary concerning the themes discussed, and of common collocations and expressions. [B.1.2 assessed]
- 3 Expressing oneself in communicative situations in Dutch orally or in writing, appropriate to the purpose, target group and media and matching C1 level of the Common European Framework. [B.6.3, assessed]
- 4 Having an understanding of and interpret more complex oral and written (academic and other) texts at C1 level of the Common European Framework even if the subject, stylistic register or accent are possible obstacles. [B.6.1 assessed]
- 5 Be familiar with the academic register in Dutch. [B.2.3 met toetsing]

### **Teaching methods**

Group work, Seminar, Independent work

**Calculation of the examination mark**

A student who is absent during the skills test without any founded reason, will not be able to pass.

Students who do not participate in one or more parts of the evaluation, cannot pass for the course unit as a whole. Should the final mark be at least 8 out of 20, it will be reduced to the highest non-deliberating score (7/20 at most).

Students must obtain at least 50% for the exam in order to pass this course. Should the final mark for students who did not pass for the exam be at least 10 out of 20, it will be reduced to 9/20.

Partial results for which the student obtained at least half of the marks can be transferred to the next exam period within the same academic year. Partial results are never rounded off.
