Position of the course

The theoretical part of this advanced course studies an important linguistic component of Spanish, notably morphology.

Contents

Morphology of contemporary Spanish: description of the basic concepts and terminology and of the most important word classes in Spanish (noun, adjective, verb, adverb) in all their different aspects.

This course also discusses different aspects of contemporary morphological variation found in the Spanish-speaking world from a sociolinguistic and dialectological perspective. In order to do so, basic concepts and terminology of these disciplines are also introduced and discussed.

The exercises treat morphology and an extensive range of lexical and grammatical constructions that are characteristic of Spanish. The students also prepare an individual task on a morphological subject.

Initial competences

To have completed the course Spanish Language Proficiency I and II and Spanish linguistics I or to have acquired the necessary skills by other means.

Final competences

- 1 To have insight into the morphological structure of contemporary Spanish.
- 2 To be able to analyse and classify Spanish words morphologically.
- 3 To have thorough knowledge of the linguistic terms and concepts of Spanish morphology.
- 4 To be able to apply Spanish morphology in practical language use.
- 5 To be able to analyze linguistic phenomena in Spanish from a morphological perspective.
- 6 To critically approach a social, topical issue from a linguistic perspective and apply it to corpus data.
- 7 To understand scientific texts on morphological phenomena in Spanish and summarize their content, if necessary, with responsible use of generative AI where needed or relevant.
- 8 Make use of digital research environments and search strategies to identify research objects.
- 9 To be familiar with the basic concepts, and inter- and transdisciplinary possibilities of Digital humanities.
- 10 To dispose of a strong awareness of language and its role in human interactions and cultural production.

Calculation of the examination mark

- Theory (50% of the grand total) and exercises (50% of the grand total: 20% paper with peer assessment and 30% written exam). In determining the mark for each student in case of group work, final responsibility on whether or not to deviate from peer assessment marks, or to disregard the peer assessment marks altogether lies with the lecturer.
