Teaching languages

Dutch

Keywords

Dutch, grammar, parts of speech, constituents, sentence types, sentence functions

Position of the course

This basic course wants to help students acquire insight into the structure of (both simple and complex) clauses and constituents in present-day Dutch and in the parts-of-speech of Dutch.

Contents

Parts of speech of Dutch; Internal structure of the phrase of Dutch; Formal and relational structure of the simple clause; Formal and relational structure of the complex clause; Dutch word order

Initial competences

The student is able to speak and write Dutch at a native (or near-native) level

Final competences

- 1 To master the basic terminology of Dutch descriptive grammar.
- 2 To be able to name and recognize the different word classes and to have insight into their defining properties.
- 3 To have insight into the internal structure of the Dutch phrase.
- 4 To have insight into the phenomenon of verb valency and the relational network of the sentence.
- 5 To be able to name the different parts of simple and complex clauses in their relation to the verb and to motivate the attribution of relational categories.
- 6 To be able to formulate and apply syntactic tests and to evaluate their outcomes.
- 7 To have insight into the principles and tendencies determining Dutch word order.
- 8 To have a good knowledge of the formal and functional properties of different kinds of main and subordinate clauses in Dutch and to be able to distinguish coordination and subordination strategies.
- 9 To be able to analyze the hierarchical-relational structure of Dutch complex clauses.
- 10 To have knowledge of the most important sources giving access to grammatical knowledge in Dutch.
