Position of the course

This advanced course offers students a deeper understanding of the various dimensions of linguistic variation in Dutch, as well as of the scholarly research conducted in this field. It builds on the first-year course *Dutch Linguistics: Introduction to Sociolinguistics*, in which students acquired foundational knowledge about the emergence of Standard Dutch and the variation landscape in Flanders. Building on that foundation, we now engage with academic research on language variation across the entire Dutch-speaking region - not only Flanders, but also the Netherlands, Suriname, and the Dutch Caribbean. Students learn to interpret and critically evaluate scientific studies, and as such also broaden and deepen their expertise in variationist linguistics.

Contents

Lectures on the diatopic, diastratic, and diafasial variation in Dutch, and on how scholars study this variation.

Initial competences

This course builds upon the competencies acquired in the subject 'Nederlandse

Taalkunde: Inleiding tot de sociolinguïstiek'. Proficiency in Dutch at a native or near-native level is essential.

Final competences

- 1 Students are capable of describing the basic principles of dialectology, variation linguistics, and sociolinguistics, and situating these disciplines in relation to other linguistic paradigms.
- 2 Students are able to describe existing variationist linguistic structures in the Dutch language area and relate them to socio-historical factors. In doing so, they demonstrate an understanding of the complex interplay between language production and perception, as well as between diatopic, diastratic, and diaphasic variation.
- 3 Students are able to analyze, interpret, and critically assess findings from variationist linguistic research, including academic publications.
- 4 Students have knowledge of methodological approaches in research on language variation (and of the advantages and disadvantages of these approaches).

- 5 Students are able to develop their own nuanced perspective on socially sensitive issues in variationist linguistics within the Dutch language area—such as the status of Standard Dutch—and to support this perspective with scientifically grounded argumentation.
