Position of the course

This course is aimed at the deepening of students' knowledge of the historical development of Dutch, with a focus on phonology, morphology, and syntax.

Contents

After an introduction to the external history of Dutch, this course offers an in-depth exploration of the main types of changes that have taken place in the various components of the Dutch language system since Old Dutch/Early Middle Dutch, as well as the mechanisms of language change underlying these developments. We successively examine the phonology, morphology, and syntax of Dutch from a diachronic perspective.

Both major changes that have had a significant impact on the structure of the

Dutch language system (e.g., changes in the Dutch vowel system, deflection, fixation of word order) and examples of minor changes that occurred within specific niches of the language system (e.g., changes in constructional semantics, the emergence or disappearance of individual syntactic constructions) are discussed. Considerable attention is given to geographical variation (and to a lesser extent, social and stylistic variation) in earlier stages of the language. An important goal of the course is that students should be able to apply the acquired knowledge and insights to understand, roughly date, and localize old texts.

Part of the lectures is therefore devoted to the linguistic analysis of concrete historical texts of various kinds (official documents, chronicles, personal letters, scientific prose, etc.). Students prepare for these text analyses through group assignments and/or are given time during class sessions to identify and comment on textual features in small groups.

- 3 Have and be able to demonstrate knowledge of patterns of regional variation in earlier stages of the Dutch language.
- 4 Have insight into the relationship between regional and diachronic language variation.
- 5 Have insight into the possibilities and limitations of various sources and tools for historical-linguistic research on Dutch.
- 6 Be able to approximately date and localize historical texts based on their linguistic characteristics, and to discuss their phonological, morphological, and syntactic properties.
- 7 Be able to understand historical texts and translate them into contemporary Dutch.
- 8 Be able to recognize and analyze concrete textual examples of specific phonological, morphological, and syntactic phenomena.
- 9 Have knowledge of important moments, actors, and processes in the external history of Dutch.

In the course, roughly half of the time is devoted to presenting theoretical material, and the other half to applying that theory to concrete examples or texts. Students are often first required to complete an exercise on their own, which is then discussed collectively in class.

Through guided independent study, students work through two or three scholarly articles.

In addition, there is an online discussion group in which the solutions to more complex exercises are discussed. Some of the exercises and concrete text analyses are prepared by the students through group work.
