Position of the course

This advanced course wants to familiarize the student with the linguistic structure of the simple sentence in contemporary Italian.

The course focuses on:

- a) Syntax of the simple sentence, from theoretical point of view.
- b) Syntax in the spoken language

Exchange students may take up this course unit, for which no prior knowledge of Dutch is required.

Knowlegde of Italian is required.

Contents

The course aims to complete, develop and deepen the linguistic knowledge of the fundamental Italian language structures. The course will focus on the study of syntax, especially in the spoken language (dialogue).

The course covers the following topics

- Syntactic analysis of the sentence: X-bar theory, semantic roles, transitive, intransitive and reflexive sentences
- Analysis of syntax in the spoken language (dialogue): sentence structure, discourse markers and disfluencies

The students will listen to and transcribe authentic audio clips from dialogues from corpora (CLIPS, API etc.). The excerpts are in standard language or in a regional standard language. The fragments are analyzed on the level of syntax and pragmatics/discourse.

During this course, students will also further develop their language skills.

- Reading skills: reading the syllabus and the presentations
- Listening skills: listening to the lessons and to the authentic audio fragments
- Writing skills: transcription of audio fragments; exercises / tests with open questions
- Speaking skills: oral discussion of fragments / exercises

Initial competences

To have successfully completed the course Italian Language proficiency I, II and III or to have acquired the necessary skills by other means. Expected language proficiency level: B1

Final competences

1 The student reaches the language proficiency level B1+

The student can understand the main idea of a complex text, including technical discussions of linguistics. He / she can respond spontaneously in a normal exchange with native speakers. He / she can produce clear, structured (oral and written) texts on a linguistic topic. Can compare various points of view and options in an argumentation.

- Reading skills: independent reading of the syllabus; reading the presentations (self-study; lectures)
- Listening skills: listening to dialogical audio clips; understanding the questions during the seminars / permanent evaluation moments (seminars; self-study)
- Writing skills: transcription of audio clips; exercises with open questions (tutorials; guided exercises; written permanent evaluation and exam)
- Speaking skills: oral discussion of exercises (seminars, oral continuous assessment)

2 The student correctly uses the linguistic terminology

3 Insight into the theory: The student understands the most important points from the content of the lesson and the syllabus

4 Insight into the theory: The student can recognize the syntactic structures that are discussed in the lessons (transitive, intransitive and reflexive sentences

5 Application of the theory: The student can independently analyze a dialogical fragment and can explain the most important syntactic/pragmatic properties of the fragment

6 Research skills: students can work independently and in groups around a research topic. Students transcribe a text and identify the relevant syntactic phenomena. They summarize the results and organize them e.g. in tables. They present the results and discuss specific cases.

Extra information on the examination methods

Combination of continuous assessment and end-of-term assessment:

Continuous assessment: exercises (50%)

End of term assessment: written exam (50%)

Second examination period:

In the second examination period, students take only the part of the evaluation for which they did not pass in the first examination period (transfer of passed partial

marks).

In the second examination period, the "continuous assessment (50%)" is replaced by additional exercises and by the oral exam.

Calculation of the examination mark

Combination of continuous assessment and end-of-term assessment:

Continuous assessment: exercises (50%)

End of term assessment: written exam (50%)

Students who eschew one or more parts of the assessment can no longer obtain a pass mark for the course unit. Should the final mark be higher than 7/20, it will be reduced to the highest non-passable mark (i.e. 7/20).

Students who are legitimately absent on certain days of the practical need to catch up the exercises they missed out on at a different time.
