**Keywords**

Italian literature, history of ideas, aesthetics of reception, intertextuality, historicism, transnational literary history, international circulation of literature.

**Position of the course**

Advanced course that aims to provide students the knowledge and skills to understand Italian literature, culture and history, to analyse them autonomously and to explain them at an academic level.

**Contents**

The success and reception of two canonical authors in Italian literary history, one from the early modern period and one from the modern period. Specifically, the course focuses on how literary texts engage in dialogue with other works (intertextuality, plagiarism, translation, parody), with history (historicism), and with a shifting national and international readership (reception, transnationalism).  
 In-depth analysis of

- Part 1 = Leopardi's style and literary, philosophical and anthropological theories through some of his most important works. This part also pays attention to Leopardi's classical sources and his international reception
- Part 2 = The international reception of Gabriele D'Annunzio and the relation between literature, politics and cultural history between the 19th and 20th centuries.

**Initial competences**

To have completed the course Italian literature IV or to have acquired the necessary knowledge and skills by other means.

### Final competences

- 1 To autonomously discuss specific theoretical aspects (e.g. rhetorics, intertextuality, reception and historicism) related to the study of the Italian literary tradition.
- 2 To independently report on personal reading and research
- 3 Knowledge of key figures and periods of Italian literary history
- 4 Knowledge of the Italian history of ideas
- 5 To situate literary texts in the context of the Italian culture and literary history
- 6 To explain ideological backgrounds and aesthetic programmes on the basis of text analysis
- 7 Advanced knowledge of Italian (B2/C1)
- 8 Command of literary terminology

End-of-term assessment:

- oral exam (part 1 and 2)

Continuous assessment:

- In-class writing assignment (part 1)
- Oral presentation (part 2)

#### **Calculation of the examination mark**

End-of-term assessment: 12 points

- oral exam = 12 points (6 points x part)

Continuous assessment: 8 points

- In-class writing assignment = 4 points (part 1)
- Oral presentation = 4 points (part 2)

Language assessment: 25% of each assessment.

Language Proficiency: Correct use of the literary terminology as well as the Italian language will be assessed in both the oral and written exams.

Students who fail to participate in the evaluation of one or more parts of the course can no longer pass for the whole of the course. If the average final score would still be a figure of ten out of twenty or more, this will be reduced to the highest unsuccessful digit (= 9).

In the second examination period students only have to redo the part of the exam that they didn't pass in the first examination period (partial exemption).
