Position of the course

This is a course for first-year students of Linguistics and Literature or Applied Linguistics who have taken their first steps in the curriculum. It builds on the language proficiency training in the first semester: on the one hand, students raise their oral and written proficiency to a higher level through discussion, small oral presentations and writing tasks. On the other hand, they learn basic techniques of literary text analysis, also using digital means. They apply these to accessible contemporary texts, graphic novels, films and radio plays, which deal with topical social issues. Through this dual focus, students acquire basic skills in academic writing and are encouraged to reflect on the contents and style of literary texts and related genres.

Contents

This course entails a reading list of recent texts from different genres (narrative prose, graphic novel, poetry, drama, essayistic prose), which deepen students' reading skills. The first lessons are hands-on sessions, in which the teachers show students how to engage in text analysis, and how to report on it. In the subsequent lessons, the students themselves get the floor. They individually complete a writing assignment and take turns orally presenting their findings in a comprehensible way. They then enter into discussions with their fellow students. In doing so, they practise both writing (paraphrase, synthesis, analysis, critical evaluation, etc.) and conversation techniques (agreement, objection, nuance, etc.). Together with the lecturers, students explore the library, the possibilities of digital humanities and of genAI for writing. Students receive individual feedforward (e.g. by means of a draft) and feedback on each of the subtasks; in this way, they can monitor their learning process well and adjust it where necessary.

- 1 To have a basic command of German and to be able to apply it in oral and written communication
- 2 To master research strategies on a basic level
- 3 To be able to conduct elementary literary text analysis, also using digital means, and to report on this
- 4 Using genAI at a basic level to improve language and style

Seminar, independent work, language practicals. This course involves two 75min course units per week per group; we aim for an ideal-typical group size of 25 participants; with current numbers, that brings us to three groups. Active participation in class is expected for this course and is reflected in the assessment. In exceptional cases, seminars may be recorded and made available upon specific request. In the event of absence, participation must be compensated for by completing alternative assignments.

End-of-term assessment (oral exam) and continuous assessment (bibliography, presentation, reaction paper, digital text analysis, Zuhörerpapier, writing assignment and participation in class). In the second exam period, a substitute task will be provided for participation.

Calculation of the examination mark

End-of-term assessment: oral exam 30%

Continuous assessment: 70%, consisting of: presentation 20%, bibliography:

7,5%, "reaction paper": 7,5%, digital humanities analysis: 7,5%, Zuhörerpapier:

7,5%, writing assignment on the presentation with reflection on the use of AI for

academic tasks: 10%, participation (class discussion): 10%

+ active participation in tutorial sessions -> bonus mark

Those with a failing grade for the end-of-term assessment cannot pass the course as a whole. If the final score would nevertheless be a mark of 10 or more out of 20, this will be reduced to the highest unsuccessful mark (i.e. 9/20). If one does not participate in the evaluation of one or more components, one can no longer pass the course unit as a whole and the final mark, if higher than 7/20, is reduced to the highest non-deliberable mark (i.e. 7/20).

The extra bonus mark can only be awarded to students who pass the course as a whole.

Facilities for Working Students

1 Although attendance is highly desirable, working students may be exempted from attendance. Students can make use of extra learning materials on Ufora or of recordings of classes to reach the course goals. For those classes where active participation is evaluated, you will need to complete substitute tasks that demonstrates your attainment of the intended competencies.
