German, language proficiency

Position of the course

This course offers students the opportunity to improve, expand and routinise their German language proficiency. It builds upon the basic grammar, vocabulary, terminology and analytical methods as taught in Ba1.

Contents

This course focuses on revising and expanding knowledge of German grammar, vocabulary and phraseology, including linguistic reflection where appropriate. Basic grammar, vocabulary, phraseology, terminology and methods of analysis as taught in Ba1 are expanded and/or deepened with reference to sentence structure, meaning, reported speech etc. The focus is on the link between structures and their use in texts. New content is presented weekly in lectures and put into practice during the weekly exercise sessions, inter alia through Dutch-German translations. Students are also expected to deliver a mandatory oral presentation with subsequent written-up version during the tutorial sessions (Tutorium). The latter takes place every two weeks and also provides additional practical exercises.

Initial competences

German: Language Proficiency I and II. All lessons are taught in German, albeit from a contrastive German-Dutch perspective where appropriate. Thorough proficiency in Dutch is required for the translation part of the written exam.

Final competences

- 1 To demonstrate advanced proficiency in German grammar, vocabulary, phraseology etc. at the level of the teaching materials.
- 2 To recognize and adequately analyse structures (including their variants, where appropriate) from various domains of the German language, both in their own terms and in contrast with Dutch, potentially involving the responsible use of GenAI.
- 3 To apply the structures discussed in the course in oral and written use of German, potentially involving the responsible use of GenAI.
- 4 To demonstrate advanced linguistic intuition and awareness.

Post-sessional (66%) and in-sessional (33%)

Students who do not take part in one or more parts of the assessment (in-sessional, post-sessional) or obtain a mark of less than 10/20 for one of its parts (in-sessional, post-sessional) cannot pass the course evaluation. Should the average mark be higher than 10/20, the final mark will be reduced to the highest non-pass mark (= 9).

If the student does not pass the in-sessional assessment, there will be a second opportunity through a compensatory activity between the first and second exam periods.

Assessment form
