Teaching languages

Position of the course

This course familiarizes students with the general and cultural history of the German-speaking countries. In this way, students expand the knowledge base that is required for language specialists with a background in linguistic and literary studies or applied linguistics.

Contents

This course (which is taught in German throughout) is dedicated to the general political, social, socio-economic and cultural development of Germany and the other German-speaking countries. An introductory, 'Landeskunde'-style survey of the present-day German-speaking countries is followed by a chronological walk through history from the Middle Ages onwards in which general and cultural history are integrated with each other as much as possible, focusing on the link between the past and the present. Mandatory background readings may be provided weekly.

Certain aspects of the content of the course may be investigated in greater depth individually in an optional paper (including a mandatory reflection on the use of sources and aids such as potentially GenAI) which accounts for a quarter of the final mark for the course. Writing a paper thus does not change the written exam but lowers the weight of the latter in the final mark by a quarter.
