Position of the course

This advanced course helps students to become thoroughly proficient in German and to gain a strong linguistic awareness. The course offers a profound scientific insight in the specific characteristics of literary texts and shows the ways in which literature functions historically.

Contents

In this course, students are stimulated to reflect on the concrete ideology-critical and text-strategical problems in texts, also from older periods (18th century). Starting point, methodology and analyses are now strongly theoretically founded. Themes change every year (revolution, emancipation, anthropology, ...).

Initial competences

To have successfully completed the course German literature III or to have acquired the necessary skills by other means.

Final competences

- 1 To be able to put a thorough knowledge of German into practice.
- 2 To be able to apply thorough knowledge of German literary traditions while analysing literary texts and situating them in a historical and stylistic context.
- 3 To be able to put the tools of analysis into practice.
- 4 To be able to critically reflect on concrete ideology-critical and text-strategical problems from older periods (18th century).
- 5 To have a sound insight in literary theory and literary studies
- 6 To be able to use genAI in an advanced and responsible way to write texts

Portfolio (take-home exam, questions on insight), completed by an oral exam. In the second exam period, new problems will be introduced.

Calculation of the examination mark

End of term assessment: Portfolio: 50%

Oral exam: 40%

Continuous assessment: Participation in class: 10%

Students who participate in the bonus programme, can earn an extra bonus mark. Those with a failing grade for either of the two end-of-term forms of assessment cannot pass the course as a whole. If the final score would nevertheless be a mark of 10 or more out of 20, this will be reduced to the highest unsuccessful mark (i.e. 9/20). If one does not participate in the evaluation of one or more components, one can no longer pass the course unit as a whole and the final grade, if higher than 7/20, will be reduced to the highest non-deliberable grade (i.e. 7/20). The extra bonus mark can only be awarded to students who pass the course as a whole.

Students can make use of extra learning materials on Ufora or of recordings of classes to reach the course goals.
