Position of the course

The aim of this advanced course is to introduce students to the development of English literature (1800 - 21th century).

Exchange students are welcome to attend this course. Knowledge of the Dutch language is not required.

Contents

The course offers a historical survey of the major periods in the development of post-1800 English literature, including a discussion of several of the key figures and their works. More specifically, the lectures will zoom in on Romantic and Victorian literature, modernism and post-modernism, and some of the main trends in

contemporary literature. The course also aims to further develop the students' academic language skills.

Lecture-based sessions are recorded and made available to all students.

Initial competences

This course builds on the knowledge and competencies acquired in the courses "English Literature: Introduction" (prose and poetry analysis) and "English Literature: Overview Before 1800."

Students may also have acquired the necessary skills by other means.

Final competences

- 1 To be familiar with crucial aspects of the oeuvre of some significant authors
- 2 To grasp how certain writers and their literature relate to one another, synchronically and diachronically
- 3 To know what makes a few important works stand out in English literary history
- 4 To have developed an insight into the character of different literary periods
- 5 To understand the interactions between literary texts and their social/political/intellectual contexts
- 6 To be able to analyze, in idiomatic English, literary texts and identify their salient qualities in light of their author's oeuvre and context
- 7 To make use of digital search environments and search strategies in order to identify appropriate research objects

Extra information on the examination methods

The evaluation takes into account the students' academic language skills (written language). It is based on two components:

- An abstract and a literary analysis paper, to be delivered during the final examination period (the exact deadlines will be announced at the beginning of the course)
- A written exam, which will consist in a number of open questions, including questions about the texts discussed in class

Calculation of the examination mark

- The paper will count towards 50% of the final grade
- The written exam will count towards 50% of the final grade
- To pass the course, students need a grade of at least 10/20 on **both** paper and written exam.
- In case of resit, students will have to retake **only the component they failed** (only applies within the same academic year)

Facilities for Working Students

Attendance is not mandatory; there are no extra reading materials for students who can't come to class.

It is possible to schedule an alternative exam during the regular exam period.

It is possible to obtain feedback at an alternative time (by appointment).
