Position of the course

This course aims to introduce the students to the main models in semantics and pragmatics of French and to enrich their vocabulary. The students are introduced to scientific research in the field of French linguistics through the paper they have to write, with attention for methodology and academic writing.

Contents

Critical survey of the main theories in meaning analysis, from historical semantics to the cognitive and pragmatic models. The various analytical techniques will be applied to a variety of French examples. Both lexical and grammatical semantics are discussed. In particular, the course covers 4 clusters:

- lexical semantics
- the syntax-semantics interface

In the seminar, the learning material is presented in an interactive way and assimilated during the practical exercises. A limited part of the course material is provided online as an interactive module on Ufora (enriched knowledge clips).

The team work consists of a written paper on a specified topic. Students are given guidance by the teaching team on campus or online, collectively and individually.

The lessons take place on campus.

Extra information on the examination methods

First examination session: Written exam + paper in group

Second examination session: written exam

Calculation of the examination mark

First examination session: written exam (80%) - paper (20%)

Second examination session: written exam (100%)

The calculation of the final mark for the written exam and for the paper takes into account the level of French. Major lexical or grammatical mistakes are penalized (until 3 points out of 20 can be removed from the total).

To pass this course, students must obtain at least 10/20 for both the periodic and non-periodic evaluation. When students get less than 10/20 for one of the two evaluation forms, then they can no longer pass the whole course unit. If the final score still reaches 10 or more, it is then brought down to the highest non-passing grade (viz. 9/20).
