### Position of the course

This course provides students with a broad background knowledge and understanding of the main modern manifestations of social life (political, social, economic, cultural) of the French-speaking world. This will enable them to better situate and critically interpret recent developments. By studying the course material, students also expand their terminological knowledge of concepts, cultural references and social phenomena.

No knowledge of Dutch is required for this course unit. Exchange students may take this course unit, provided they possess the required language skills and initial competences.

### Contents

Based on various themes, the course highlights current social life in the French-speaking world. Examples of themes:

- The French language and the image of France in the world
- Political structure and institutions
- Social geography
- Social and cultural practices

All themes are discussed using a selection of relevant publications and excerpts from various (audio-visual) media. Students are asked to critically review the didactic material prior to some lectures, and study relevant vocabulary.

#### **Initial competences**

An adequate knowledge of French, both passive and active (minimum level B1 of the ECC).

#### **Final competences**

- 1 Formulate insights about contemporary francophone society in correct French, using appropriate terminology.
- 2 Have a thorough knowledge of the cultural and institutional backgrounds of the French-speaking world and be able to use that knowledge to reflect critically on social developments and intercultural transfers.
- 3 To actively monitor new developments within the general context of the French language, society and culture, to reflect critically on them and to place them in a broad social and intercultural framework.
- 4 Judging and acting with appropriate self-reflection in cultural contexts.
- 5 Demonstrate intercultural awareness: linguistic and cultural sensitivity and respect for diversity.
