**Position of the course**

"History and culture of Russia" gives an overview of the history of Russia, providing students with broad background knowledge on the country, its society, institutions and culture. This study unit takes into account the language skills acquired in the first three semesters and prepares students for other culture-related units (Literature and Area Studies).

**Contents**

The course unit "History and Culture of Russia" consists of two parts.  
The first part (weeks 1-6) provides a global political, socio-economic and cultural overview of Russian history, from the foundation of the Russian state in the 9th century to the present day. It covers the following historical periods: the "Kiev-Rus" and Mongol occupation; Muscovia; the Russian Empire; the Golden Age of Russia; the Russian Revolution and the Soviet period; Perestroika and Glasnost; Russia in the 21st century.  
The second part (weeks 7-12) focuses specifically on modern Russian art (painting, sculpture, music and film) of the 20th and 21st centuries.
