Position of the course

This introductory course addresses the historical events that have, starting from the middle of the 19th century, determined the creation of the modern Chinese nation state and the contemporary de facto existence of two Chinese political entities (the People's Republic of China on the mainland, and the Republic of China on the island Taiwan and some islands in the Taiwan Strait and the South China Sea). This course focuses on the peculiarities of these two political entities and their historical position in the global context. This course is the logical supplement to the course 'History of China' that focuses on premodern China.

Contents

In this course, the way China has, starting from the middle of the 19th century, become part of the global world as a result of the European expansion into Asia, and how China has redefined itself in this global world. More specifically, the impact Western concepts such as nationalism, socialism, Marxism-Leninism, and communism have had on the Chinese state building since the end of the empire (19th century and early twentieth century), and during the Republic of China and the People's Republic of China are addressed. Herefrom, the historical trajectory that China has gone through up and until the present day are discussed. For the contemporary global world, the growing impact China has in the geopolitical, geo-economic, and geostrategic domains are discussed. Also the global importance of the contemporary de facto existence of two Chinese political entities – the People's Republic of China on the mainland, and the Republic of China on the island Taiwan and some islands in the Taiwan Strait and the South China Sea – is discussed.

- 8 8. To be able to understand the development of the contemporary de facto existing two Chinese political entities;
- 9 9. To be able to contextualize the international impact of the de facto existence of two Chinese political entities
