Position of the course

This advanced course wants to initiate students in independent linguistic research and scientific reporting.

Contents

This advanced course gives thorough insight in the practical application of different methods for linguistic research. It teaches the students to execute autonomous linguistic research by analysing a linguistic object qualitatively or quantitatively, and by reporting on this research in the form of a presentation and/or paper. The course is designed as a methodological accompaniment to the bachelor paper.

This seminar consists of three parts:

- 1 video tutorials (Ufora) (7.5h) on general methodology, heuristics and ICT in linguistics;
- 2 three methodological tracks of 7.5h ;
- 3 language- or section-specific sessions (15h) during which students are divided into groups.

Initial competences

To have successfully followed General Linguistics and the linguistics courses per language studies, or to have acquired the end competences of those courses in another way.

Final competences

- 1 To develop and answer a research question.
- 2 To have a thorough knowledge of different methodological approaches in linguistics.
- 3 To analyse a linguistic object by choosing one or more linguistic methods.
- 4 To critically evaluate paradigmatic and methodological choices.
- 5 To perform linguistic research individually and/or in group.
- 6 To report on research in a scientifically correct way.
- 7 To master the basic heuristics of linguistics, more specifically with respect to the study of the object language (to retrieve publications, to localize them in the library and to constitute a reference list according to the international standards).

Continuous assessment: presentation of the results of the student's research + participation in the activities during the language- or section-specific sessions related to the different stages in their personal research.

Portfolio: 5-10 pages in the language of the bachelor paper, in which the student reports on the following issues:

- Critical reflection on the research project (research question, theoretical framework and hypotheses, existing literature on the subject, methodology, discussion of the results).
- What is/are the methodological track(s) you have chosen?
- What meetings did you arrange with your supervisor, how were the feedback sessions and the follow-up sessions organized?
- What other activities did you envisage and/or carry out with respect to your research project (e.g. did you take a tutorial on MS Forms in view of conducting a survey)?

Deadline portfolio: by the **end of May** (first examination period) or **end of August** (second examination period). The portfolio must be uploaded in Ufora (under "Opdrachten").

Calculation of the examination mark

50% Final presentation: in the language- or section-specific sessions

50% continuous assessment:

- 40%: Tasks and presentations in the language- or section-specific sessions
- 10%: Portfolio.

Not participating in all parts of the assessment entails the student cannot pass the course. If the final score would be 10 or more out of 20, then the score will be reduced to the highest failing mark (9/20).
