Position of the course

This course aims to familiarize students with the main Italian contemporary prose forms (20th-21stcenturies). The course teaches students how to apply different methods of analysis when investigating Italian modern and contemporary prose. Special focus on situating texts in their historical context. In this course the students learn to master the Italian language on an advanced level. The courseprovides the students with understanding of the scientific approach to literature.

Contents

In this course, the evolution of Italian literature in the 20th and 21st century is dealt with by means of specific case studies. By studying representative texts, students are familiarized with historical and ideological backgrounds.

The students are invited to actively participate in textual analysis and the critical argumentation.

Close reading and exercise on a specific research topics and case studies.

Basic concepts of narratology and literary history.

Advanced knowledge of Italian (level B1/B2) and basic command of literary terminology.

Initial competences

To have completed the courses of Italian of the first year and of the first semester of the second bachelor or to have acquired the necessary skills by other means.

The language proficiency will be assessed in the written assignment as well as during the oral examination.

Calculation of the examination mark

Continuous assessment:

- Portfolio: 8 points

End-of-term assessment:

- Two questions from the list of exam questions: 12 points

Language proficiency

- Paper 3 out of 8 points

- Oral exam 4 out of 12 points

Students who fail or do not participate in the full evaluation of both the continuous assessment and the end-of-term assessment can no longer pass the whole course. If the final score would still be a mark of ten out of twenty or more, this will be reduced to the highest unsuccessful grade (= 9).

In the second examination period the student only has to redo the part (parts) of the exam that he/she did not pass (or participate) in the first examination period (transfer of pass marks).
