Position of the course

Spanish: Area studies (S4M0) builds on the students' knowledge of Spain and Latin America in the 20th and 21st centuries. Both modules offer a structured insight into recent social developments in Spain and Latin America.

Exchange students may take up this course unit. Exchange students may take up just one module, worth 3 credits, of this course unit. No prior knowledge of Dutch is required for this module.

Contents

This course unit has two sub-units.

S4M0_SP: This sub-unit focuses on specific topics related to the recent history of Spanish society from 1982 to the present. Topics are introduced thematically and include: (a) the electoral system, political parties and major political events; (b) regional autonomies in Spain (Basque Country and Catalonia); (c) multilingualism in Spain; (d) the image of Spain abroad;

(e) the economical strengths and weaknesses.

S4MO_LA: This module focuses on society-related developments in Latin American and the Caribbean countries, thereby covering the following perspectives: demography, healthcare, social issues, politics, the economy, finance, human rights. The course addresses important debates which continue to dominate Latin American society such as North-South relations (in particular USA versus LA and Caribbean countries), guerrilla, regional leadership, leftist/rightist regimes, economic boost, war against drugs, corruption, violence, women's rights, rights of the indigenous people.

This course also includes reading material (reader). Details will be communicated via the electronic learning environment.

Initial competences

The students:

- are familiar with important concepts and realia from the cultural history of the language area;
- can retrieve information about the language area's cultural history, drawing on appropriate sources;
- can frame the language area's current affairs in a cultural and historical context.

- 5 Displaying a commitment to lifelong learning [M. 3.4. ; not assessed]
- 6 Integrating language and cultural sensitivity and respect for diversity into the professional environment and the social debate [M. 5.2.; not assessed].
