### Position of the course

Methods of evaluation and teaching can be subject to change, due to Covid-19. Any changes will be communicated via Ufora.

The goal of the course unit "German: Translation into German" (D4VV) is to improve the students' translation skills by translating general texts from Dutch into German. Attention will be paid to further expanding the students' vocabulary, to teaching them how to translate texts as they typically occur in the translation sector into a linguistically and stylistically correct German, to integrating cultural and societal knowledge into the translation process and to using parallel texts in the target language as well as traditional and digital dictionaries and encyclopaedias.

### Contents

In this course unit, we work with texts from the translation sector mainly dealing with cultural and societal topics (journalistic texts, touristic texts, PR texts, ...). We strive to a stronger awareness of translatory problems and of possible translation strategies to solve these problems. We also aim at a critical reflection of intercultural differences, the communicative situation, the handling of sources and the link between translation theory and practice.

We choose a process-oriented approach that starts from a specific translation assignment. In a subsequent step, the students prepare the translation of each text, during class or at home, and individually or in small groups, using, among other, dictionaries, encyclopaedias, parallel texts and background texts. The students reflect on their translation (process analysis). A selection of translated texts will be discussed during class.
