Position of the course

The study unit Nederlands voor Conferentietolken (Dutch for conference interpreters) aims to train various skills required for conference interpreting in general and conference interpreting into Dutch in particular: note taking techniques, meeting techniques, presentation skills, speaking skills in Dutch. Special attention is paid to the existing linguistic norms at all levels: pronunciation, wording, syntax, register,...
For an adequate interpretation of spoken discourse, it is also crucial for interpreters to have a basic knowledge of the relevant subject field, i.a. in order to select the appropriate equivalent in Dutch. This is why this course also involves systematic development of students' ready knowledge.

Contents

The learning content addresses the following components:

- Basics of note taking (for new students) en special topics in note taking

technique; students practise note taking and Dutch-Dutch reformulation

- Attention is paid to the main aspects of presentational behaviour of interpreters such as pronunciation, articulation, breathing technique and voice control, prosody, eye contact and posture. The students learn to assess their own presentations by analyzing recordings and get to practise the different sub-skills
- Attention is paid to speaking skills in Dutch (word level, sentence level, level of the paragraph and text). For that purpose the students are given formulating exercises (improvisation, discussion exercises) and reformulating exercises. Throughout the course, attention is given to spoken standard Dutch.
- Attention is paid to the development of ready knowledge. Students receive suggestions for an individual learning path and build a portfolio to document their learning process. In oral presentations on a wide range of subjects they practise the use of domain specific vocabulary and collocations and acquire new thematic knowledge.
- Attention is paid to meeting techniques. Students are introduced to the conventions and terminology of various meeting genres and observe and organise a meeting.

Initial competences

The student:

- has an excellent command of Dutch;
- has a broad general knowledge about a wide range of topics, including politics, economics, culture, technology and science;
- is stress-resistant and displays sustained powers of concentration.

- 6 Applying insights in the dynamics and conventions of meetings as a linguistic and communicative genre in order to solve problems arising in interpreted meeting settings [MT 6.4]

Extra information on the examination methods

First session: skills test (100% = 5x 20%)

Students are assessed on five different occasions: twice in the first and three times in the second semester. In the first semester, they are assessed during a presentation on a given topic and a speaking skills test. In the second semester, they are evaluated during a meeting which they simulate, a speaking skills test, a presentation on a given topic related to their portfolio.

Second session: oral exam (100%), subject to the students also having taken part in the tests during the year.
