Position of the course

The study unit "English: Intercultural Project" (E3IP) encourages students to

(Approved)

independently expand their knowledge of the relevant language area, and apply this knowledge to a project, which involves:

- completing an assignment related to the (inter)cultural and institutional backgrounds of the language area in question;
- linked to the topics addressed in the project, contact and interview organisations or individuals and/or collect relevant data. In the interviews or the data analysis, the students give evidence of the fact that they have creatively processed the content of the reading assignment and of a personal reflection on the relevant social, scientific and/or ethical problems, and of the similarities and differences between cultures;
- reporting on the completed assignment either orally and in writing.

Contents

The study unit "English: Intercultural Project" (E3IP) involves:

- an introductory session with the student which outlines the objectives and practical modalities of the project, the assignment per language and the content of the components which is to be processed individually;
- processing the relevant information independently;
- preparing interviews and/or data collection by contacting organisations and/or individuals. Reporting on both tasks to the project supervisor;
- conducting interviews and/or collecting and making a recording and/or corpus of these;
- keeping a log of the completed written and oral activities;
- giving a presentation, showcasing the key results of the tasks; following by Q&A about assignment and literature study
