Position of the course

The master dissertation consists of a written and oral part and focuses on a maritime topic from a legal, technical, economical, logistical, policy or other relevant perspective, or a combination of those approaches. The purpose of the master dissertation is to obtain knowledge and understanding, leading to a thorough insight into the topic concerned. The scientific character of the dissertation implies the use of all relevant sources concerning the chosen topic and the capacity to critically analyze and evaluate the problem at hand. The master dissertation aims to realize tangible progress with regard to the student's research skills, written abilities and oral presentation skills.

Contents

The topic of the master dissertation is chosen in consultation between the student and the supervisor. The topic should be linked to the content of one of the courses of the MSc in Maritime Science (general course or optional course), taught by the supervisor. Students can suggest a topic to a supervisor of their choice or can contact one of the professors for possible topic suggestions.

The master dissertation is typewritten in English and contains maximum 20.000 words (including footnotes; excluding title page, table of contents, bibliography and possible annexes), unless the supervisor authorized a higher limit. It needs to be well-structured and consists of a title page (a template is provided), a table of contents (with page numbers), an introduction, a conclusion, a main part in between (with as many chapters as considered necessary), a bibliography and possible annexes.

The citing of sources is very important and a master dissertation should include all necessary references. Using (structures of) texts or ideas of another author without quotation is deemed plagiarism, which is prohibited by and will be sanctioned. Students must be selective and have to make sure that they use adequate, reliable sources. If generative AI is used in the research or writing process, this must happen in a responsible manner, in accordance with relevant regulations and guidelines.

All references must be consistent and have to correspond to prevalent citation methods within the specific discipline. Every source that is used throughout the

work needs to be mentioned in the bibliography at the end of the master dissertation, divided by type of source and alphabetically/chronologically. Students may not refer to sources they didn't consult.

The written part of the master dissertation is followed by a public oral defense in presence of a jury, consisting of the supervisor and an assessor.

Extra information on the examination methods

The written part of the master dissertation is followed by a public oral defense. The student presents the research in 10 minutes, followed by 15-20 minutes of further discussion on the basis of questions from the jury members.

At least three guidance moments (comprising individual consultations, group sessions, written feedback, ...) should be held throughout the master dissertation process in order for the student to be allowed to submit and defend the master dissertation. If students would be at risk of violating this rule, thereby jeopardizing

successful submission of the dissertation, they will be informed by the supervisor.

Calculation of the examination mark

Following the oral defense, the jury members deliberate and evaluate the process, written dissertation and oral defense of the master dissertation in a holistic manner, in the absence of the student and on the basis of a standardized grading sheet.

The final examination mark is determined following the completion of the three mandatory components of the evaluation (process, written dissertation, oral defense). The final mark is not the mathematical sum of hypothetical grades for each of the components, but is based on the extent to which the student has achieved the final competences. The oral defense is essential in this regard to assess whether the student masters the content of the dissertation and has developed the work in a satisfactory manner, taking into account requirements of scientific integrity. Students who fail to complete one of the evaluation components, cannot pass.
