Lectures with video demonstrations of how research is conducted in reality and/or illustrations of the concepts. Attention is paid to the cross-cultural differences in social psychological phenomena. The chapter aggression explicitly discusses criminal behavior and the effectiveness of punishment to reduce delinquency. The chapter law psychology addresses phenomena that may lead to fault verdicts, like false confessions and mistakes of eyewitnesses
