Position of the course

In this course, students are introduced to the sub-domains of political science and the related academic research by means of a topical political problem. The course has an activating and cooperative set-up.

Contents

This course examines a number of contemporary political issues in the various sub-domains of the political science programme. It wants to indicate how political science knowledge can contribute to insight and/or policy regarding these issues. The emphasis is on problem-oriented thinking and an active participation of and cooperation between the students that takes shape through interaction with the lecturers. Besides the generic parts, the course consists of a modular structure in which different teams of lecturers work from their field of specialisation. In a first phase, students receive information about all modules, but in a second phase, they choose one module, around which they will perform some assignments. However, the approach in the modules is common along the following lines.

1 Semester 1: in an introductory lecture, the responsible teacher and his co-teachers explain the goal, the means and the evaluation of this course unit.

2 Semester 1: Students are introduced to a current political problem or issue from the five distinct sub-domains via plenary lectures, focusing on how political science deals with the problem or issue. (All students attend all lectures and then choose a module that coincides with the respective sub-domain).

3 Semester 1: In small groups, students discuss a topical political issue, moderated by the lecturer. Students do this 2 times, from 5 subdomains, the students choose 2:

- a) National politics
- b) European politics
- c) International politics
- d) Conflict & Development

e) Sustainability

4 Semester 2: Students read and process academic literature offered by the lecturers, which builds on the current political problem introduced in their module.

5 Semester 2: Students are introduced to academic writing in political science. They are introduced to the principles of looking up academic information (incl. e-library), managing and referring to sources and academic writing.

These principles are first explained to all students in a combination of lecture and tutorial. Then, for each module, the students make a paper in which these principles are applied for the first time. In the paper they show, with correct references, how the processed sources broaden the insight concerning the studied current political problem. This is done in a 'controlled setting', avoiding making the assignment via AI.

There is also a second paper, also in a controlled setting, without AI: students read an article and answer some questions about it.

6. Semester 2: The students participate in a workshop set up by the respective modules and related to the current political problem they are studying. Students are assessed on their participation in the workshop and their interaction with their peers and tutors.

Extra information on the examination methods

- Semester 1. The students debate in small groups 2 times about current political topics in the 5 sub-domains (so 1 debate per sub-domain).

- Semester 2. The students write 2 papers for this course, without AI:

Paper 1: students are given a keyword and answer questions about it on the basis of solid and diverse sources, to which they refer correctly.

Paper 2: Answering some questions about an article that is read in advance.

- Semester 2. The students participate in an interactive workshop on the topical political problem dealt with.

Calculation of the examination mark

To pass this course unit, the student must participate in 2 debates in the first semester. When not participating in the 2 debates, a final score of 10 or more out of 20 is reduced to a 9/20.

For the final score calculation, the following counting rules apply:

- Attendance at the debates: 2 x 1 points (total 2 points) - students who participate constructively and substantiated in the debates can earn a 'plus', which gives them an extra point in the final score calculation.

-paper 1: 6 points

- paper 2: 6 points

- Participation in the interactive workshop: 6 points

The second examination opportunity is possible in a modified form.
