**Position of the course**

The course allows to theorize on previously acquired knowledge on international politics. It is also crucial for the development of the Bachelor and Master dissertation. The course has two objectives: 1) familiarizing students with the main theoretical perspectives for the study of international politics, 2) teaching the application of these theories.

**Contents**

After an introduction to actors, levels of analysis, and the concept of power, thorough examination is conducted on realism, liberalism, English School, Marxism, neo-Gramscianism, social constructivism, feminism, post-colonialism, and analysis of national foreign policy.

**Initial competences**

- A general historical framework and a basic factual knowledge of contemporary international politics are required. Reading a comprehensive book on international politics from 1815 to the present is recommended.
- Students are expected to closely follow international topical developments throughout the academic year so that they can adequately apply theoretical insights to them.
- Students must be open to theoretical approaches that go beyond the anecdotal and journalistic.

## **Final competences**

- 1 To have profound knowledge of the main theoretical paradigms regarding international relations, with attention to the historical dimension.
- 2 To be able to interpret the current world order and important historical and topical events and developments.
- 3 To be able to analyse the various components of an international problem (among other things, actors, interests, ideas, power resources, power relations, institutions, ...).
- 4 To be able to apply in a critical and - if relevant - eclectic manner the main theoretical paradigms regarding international relations in the assessment of international trends and events.
- 5 To be able to efficiently locate and process literature about theory building.
- 6 Being able to independently and creatively apply the important theoretical paradigms in international relations to the development of the Bachelor and Master dissertation.
- 7 Being able to critically evaluate studies on international politics from theoretical and methodological perspectives.
- 8 When observing international trends and events, being able to transcend a journalistic or anecdotal approach by systematically demonstrating a theoretical, scientific reflex.
